The reassuring novelty

n an era of lasting uncertainty, in short, in the presence of a condition of change, we are here and lack the ground beneath our feet because we do not know how to make ends meet; what will become of us, our families, the future of our children, even just thinking about the day after tomorrow. Then, suddenly, a novelty. And, if I approach it cautiously, I discover that this novelty does not bring nasty surprises, rather, it tastes good.

A man tells me, "the real power is service", he looks into my eyes and asks me to trust him, reminding me that those who are higher up should be at the service of those who are lower down. And he does so in the oldest fashion in the world, that is, he gives me simple, symbolic demonstrations to deserve my trust. He immediately puts a cross around his neck that is not gold and decides to call himself Francis. Certainly, it would not have seemed strange if Pope Francis had chosen the name of a Jesuit saint, so much so that at the beginning some had suggested further legitimate connections with St. Francis Xavier of the Society of Jesus. But no, for his name he chose that of a saint of a religious order different from his own. This also seems like a sign that is not at all obvious. And to think that there

POPE FRANCIS. CROSS AND FORGIVENESS

From Archbishop of Pope from the Americas. Jorge Mario Bergoglio is Jesuit and became Pope on 13 March 2013, taking the name of Francis born in the Argentine capital to parents who had emigrated from Piedmont. Pope Francis was and is a simple shepherd which he visited by moving around with the underground and buses, as for the entire Church. His message of humility and peace bursts out through Love of the Cross and the knowledge that there is forgive. Faced with the evil of the world, Pope Francis reminds us that God did not remain in si-Cross of Christ: a word him: he awaits you with

were those who, like me, interpreted this choice as the desire to satisfy a request from the world "outside" the Curia; in fact, "Francis" was a name (highly symbolic of a need for change) that had been widely called for just before the Conclave. These two details - the cross and the name - struck my imagination when Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio was elected Pope on 13 March. For me, they render the Pope's message incredibly new, when he uses the language of dialogue that cuts across the religious and cultural background of each of us, bringing in values such as love for the weakest and humility, in both the material and spiritual sense. It is true that "he has not invented anything",



the message is that of Jesus Christ, that every Pope before him has conveyed. But the novelty, which has reassured us all, lies in having accompanied his words with facts that are immediately perceived by the common people not only as concrete but as decidedly unexpected, based on physical gestures and the immediacy of lan-

guage, at a moment in time marked by so many twists and turns that destabilise us and old ways of thinking to the point of collapse; at a moment in time when we need a missionary Pope; at a moment in time when there is a need for social justice. All this is perfectly embodied in the gestures of Pope Bergoglio.

CARD. GRECH: "HE IS THE POPE OF THE PEOPLE"

In the homily of his inauguration mass on 19 March, the keywords used by

Pope Francis were "service" "Tenderness" and "caring for creation". The Holy Father has taken St. Francis as his model of life, and this, of course, is translated into practice with his love for poverty, both in words and in deeds. For example, in Buenos Aires (when he was a cardinal), Bergoglio took the bus, he did not even want his car; he took the underground, he was always among the people, so he has already lived his life as a "Franciscan". And then, of course humility which he already showed when he asked the people (on the day of his election, 13 March 2013, *ed.*), in St. Peter's Square to pray for him. He is the Pope of the people.

And this perhaps suggests some hints of a possible programme? Of course, Pope Francis knows that there are problems in the Curia, there is a need to make changes; he will make them.

Do you see the intention of Pope Francis to continue on the path of transparency traced by Pope Ratzinger? Ratzinger, it is true, has a completely different character ... I personally am very attached to the Pope Emeritus, because I worked with him for twenty years in the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. Of course, each Pope has his own personality, his own character, his own ideological, pastoral background ... but I see in Pope Francis more of an affinity with Pope John XXIII, whom he also resembles through his search for simplicity. Pope John was a so-called "transitional Pope" but then, by inaugurating the Second Vatican Council, he changed a bit the whole Church, the entire world. Augustinian Cardinal Prospero Grech gave the opening sermon at the Conclave that elected Argentine Jesuit Jorge Mario Bergoglio as Pope.


Roberto Bedetti, 37, opens the door of his car for the short ritual of introduction. His smile is generous. Then, back in the car, yes, I will follow you with my own, through a tangle of increasingly narrow bottleneck streets to Sacrofano (Rome). Until we come out in front of a building, go through here, and come to the door. He welcomes me to a home that is humble like him, full of love like him; that love that is framed in his eyes and on the kitchen door in drawings by his two older daughters, Victoria, 5 years, and Beatrice, 4, that he had with Stefania.

The drama begins on the day of the birth of Rita, the third daughter, named in honour of the patron saint of impossible cases, to whom the couple is very devoted. But that same moment of light, in fact, coincides with the darkness that envelopes Stefania. Immediately after giving birth, the woman goes into a coma. It is 31 July 2012. Stefania will not stay much longer in Rome, where there is no place for her, so she is admitted to a clinic on the outskirts of Imola. And everything changes.

efore his beloved Stefania went into a coma, Roberto Bedetti was in charge of the bar in the Casa del Cinema in Rome. Today, he has had to abandon his role as supervisor and go back to being a simple bartender in the place where, through the windows, you can enjoy one of the most beautiful views in

the world: the park of Villa Borghese, with the small church where the tiny Rita was baptised the day after our conversation of 20 March.

The family lives on one salary and the living room contains the essentials: little Rita peacefully asleep, Stefa-

nia's mother Pierina sitting on the couch next to me, family photos and two cups of freshly brewed coffee. "I get strength somewhere else, even I don't not know where from ... I can't explain it," Roberto tells me, talking about the enormous faith he has had since a very young age, when he breathed it at home with his parents and his brothers, one of whom, Antonio, has been in a wheelchair since birth.

"With Stefania, we always went to the Sanctuary of Cascia. We also bought Saint Rita wedding rings ... Stefania and I have worn them for the last five years."

"We are devoted to Saint Rita because of our first child, Vittoria. She was born with a major congenital infection; the doctors told me not to see her, that she would not have survived 24 hours; but I placed holy pictures of Saint Rita and Pope John Paul II and left. I prayed for days. And the little girl is now fine. She goes to kindergarten, and this year she'll go to primary school; she is more intelligent than normal."

"The evening before Stefania gave birth to Rita, she was very afraid, she lit a candle to Saint Rita and prayed to the saint. And she's still alive, after all that she has been through ... In the early days, I almost couldn't take it anymore. Instead, now, it's

THREE QUESTIONS TO A YOUNG DEVOTEE

Mauro Farina, a 20-year-old university student, lives in Augusta and is active in the Parish of the Sacred Heart of Jesus; with the help of parish priest Father Davide, he has helped to spread the cult of Saint Rita in the city, which was already closely linked to the Patroness of impossible cases.

Mauro, tell us about your "encounter" with Saint Rita? It occurred at an early age. As a child, I learned about her figure through my grandparents. Over the years, thanks to information about her life and her miracles transmitted to me by the parish priest and one of the leaders of the Primary Pious Union (association dedicated to the cult of Saint Rita, see pages 18 and 19 of this issue, ed.), I have cultivated this attachment to the saint and it is steadily becoming stronger.

In your everyday life as a 20-year-old university student, what is your commitment to spreading the cult of Saint Rita among your peers and beyond? In my daily life, I have a lot to do with my peers, especially during meetings of Catholic Action. Rita is often the subject of our conversations, because of her testimony of faith and services towards others.

What is the most important lesson that the experience of Santa Rita has given you and how do you follow it in your life? The strongest teaching is humility. In the world of today we are used to having always to be first, to have to do "the lion's share". On the other hand, Rita has been, and will be, an example of meekness and humility. As far as I am concerned, I am often called on to play the role of "leader" and I always try to refer to Rita to avoid falling into arrogance.

only by prayer that I carry on. It makes me feel ... a force ... I can't explain it. Sometimes I leave the hospital and maybe Stefania has not given any signs and is worse. But in the evening I recite the rosary ... The next day I'd do it

again, I sleep 4 hours! It's as if I had slept for 24 hours, I feel stronger than before."

"I told my daughters that mummy has to wake up, I told them the truth because they are very intelligent. Along with my daughters, we pray."

Interview with Gloria, 38, supporter of the Saint Rita Beehive

loria, you wrote to us: "Every night, in her prayers, my child reminds Jesus to always protect her Little Bee friends".

How did this feeling of friendship for young people who live miles away from you

come about? My daughter is always asking me for a little brother but, unfortunately, that's not possible. A priest showed us around the monastery and my daughter stopped in front of the white windows of the Beehive, saying to the priest: "Maybe Jesus does not send me a little brother because what I can do for Him I can do for the "little bees". According to Chiara, the trip to Cascia has not brought her a little brother but a large family.

In your opinion, what is the value of a contribution, however small, in favour of those in need? In my opinion, it's not the value of money that counts but the meaning of the love with which one makes a donation and sacrifice, in this case that I and my little girl make.

How important is the teaching of Saint Rita of Cascia in your choice of charity? Saint Rita is my strength, my light, my courage; she is the sun that enters my





house in the morning, the smile on my daughter's face when I take her to the schoolbus. That little help that we give to the Little Bees and the relationship that has developed between my daughter and her new friends is an encouragement to always be better in the journey with God and we hope that with these small gestures there might be a better world one day.

The Little Bees will carry you and little Chiara in their hearts, even when they are grown up. Do you have a message for them? The message I give to my little girls is to always carry in their heart and soul the teachings they have learned in the Beehive and never forget the faith that has been transmitted, to never give up in the face of any difficulties in life, especially when they leave the Beehive to start their lives in the outside world. To always walk beside the Lord Jesus, because God sees and provides, and a great example of God's hand is the creation of the Beehive to give a future to these little girls.


The coat of arms of the Augustinians

ach religious order has its own sign of recognition, its coat of arms, which graphically describes the guiding principle of the religious order to which members belong.

Santa Rita, as is known, is a cloistered nun of the Augustinian Order. Her spiritual father is St. Augustine, who wrote a *Rule* for all male and female monasteries and which, in the course of monastic history, has been very successful because of its essentiality and simplicity, based on the Gospel and respect for the dignity of the human person. The coat of arms represents a book under a flaming heart pierced by an arrow.

The text of Augustine that inspired it is the following: "You pierced my heart with your word, and I loved you" (Percussisti



cor meum verbo tuo, et amavi te), (Confess.X, 6, 8). The book is the Holy Scripture, which, like a double-edged sword,

IN MEMORY OF FATHER TACK

"With a sense of sadness and loss, I am writing to inform you that Fr. Theodore Tack died on 10 February 2013 in Tulsa, Oklahoma". It was the Prior General of the Order of St. Augustine (OSA), Father Robert Prevost, who announced the news, immediately after the ascension to heaven of the Prior General Emeritus. A Member of the Province of Chicago, Fr. Tack was Prior General of the OSA between 1971 and 1983. "During his mandate," continued Fr. Prevost, "he directed the renewal of the Order with determination and conviction, fol-



lowing the spirit of the Second Vatican Council, together with the Constitutions of the Order, whose Special General Chapter was renewed in Villanova in 1968. The document of the intermediate General Chapter of 1974, under the guidance of Fr. Tack, made public the well-known "Dublin Document" which clearly shows how to understand the life of the community and was a force for transformation in the life of the Order".

The Augustinian Community of Cascia and the Editorial Committee and Editorial staff of From the Roses to the Bees join the entire Augustinian Family in the most heartfelt prayers to the Lord for the eternal repose of Fr. Theodore Tack.

penetrates the hearts of those who seek the Lord like an arrow, and inflames the love of God. The coat of arms describes the personality of Augustine, a tireless seeker of Truth (that is, of God), which he has looked for everywhere, even along mistaken paths, and once found, has united himself to it for ever.

But love of God is love of Christ which, drunk with milk from the mother's breast, became the raison d'être of his apostolate, along with the Church, whose mission continues until the end of time. The reason for the effectiveness of his activities as a pastor was to have been the *servant of the servants of God and of the Church (see Letter 217)*. It is the synthesis of the spirituality of the Order: Truth is sought which, with the guidance of the Word of God, finds in the diversity of brothers unity of mind and heart reaching out to God. It finds LOVE.

A CONFERENCE FOR HOPE IN THE CHURCH

From 27 to 30 March, the Friends of St. Augustine gathered at the Hotel delle Rose in Cascia for the conference on "The hopes raised by the Council delivered to the Church of today's world", dedicated to the Second Vatican Council, 50 years after its opening. In fact, it was the Second Vatican Council that encouraged the birth of the Friends of St. Augustine. For the then young members of the association, Saint Rita represented along the way what Blessed John Paul II called the "feminine genius" and the tenderness of a mother, with the heart of her Sisters open to the call of the Council for young people. And the Conference was organised precisely for renewing this call towards the boys and girls of today, to welcome them and encourage them to be the new hope of the Church.



Learning from the saints

he cult of the saints has always played a central role in the lives of Christians. Ever since the first centuries of the diffusion of Christianity, when communities were persecuted, the testimony of the martyrs who, in not denying Christ did not hesitate to give their lives, were a valuable encouragement for the faithful and a reason for hope: if those men and women of all ages and from all walks of life became sanctified through giving themselves, saintliness is really possible. Capitalising on this ancient practice, even the Second Vatican Council, in the constitution on its Sacrosanctum Concilium liturgy promulgated just fifty years ago (4 December 1963) states the following about the liturgical calendar: "The feasts of the saints proclaim the wonderful works of Christ in His servants, and display to the faithful fitting examples

for their imitation" (SC 111). Many women and men of our own time declare their devotion to Saint Rita, and perhaps we ourselves are among these; however, we might ask to whom Rita herself was devoted. Obviously, the spirituality of Rita is centred on the passion of Christ; his forehead, marked by the stigma of the spine, was the outward and visible sign of a completely internal assimilation of the Crucifix. Rita was also devoted to Mary, dearly loved by all the people of Cascia. But among the saints, which did she choose as her special patrons? Ancient tradition answers the first question, indicating John the Baptist, Augustine and Nicholas of Tolentino as the protectors of Rita, but does not explain why them and not others. Perhaps we can find an explanation by carefully scrutinising Rita's life and the way in which she imitated her heavenly patrons. John the

Baptist is the prophet who retires into the wilderness to be alone with God, but at the same time works with audacity so that the world becomes a better place: Rita must have seen in him the synthesis of Christian life, of her life. For Rita the Augustinian nun, Augustine and Nicholas will be respectively father and brother; sharing the style of life expressed in that Rule that puts the search for God at the centre of inwardness and sharing in the community, Rita also grew up in love until reaching the heights of holiness. The Saints loved Christ with a total

This young man had to face a risky operation due to a spinal tumour, set for 2 August last year. A miracle happened, because the tumour regressed and it was no longer necessary to operate. I know with certainty that it was Saint Rita who protected him with her immense faith, so that the doctors no longer had to operate. I had promised that if this was to happen I would have publicly given thanks for this miracle! My heart, my soul, my family are full of the joy of having You and our Lord God among us. We love you.

Every year, on the occasion of the Feast of Saint Rita from 20 to 22 May, Cascia joins in partnership with a town in the world that has a strong connection with Saint Rita. For 2013, the Twinning of peace and faith brings together Cascia and Râmnicu Vâlcea in Romania, where the first Greek-Catholic church in the country dedicated to the Saint was built in 2006.

Twinning Cascia-Râmnicu Vâlcea

the deed for the foundation

ith the collapse of the communist regime (the Romanian Revolution of 1989, ed.) and after the return of the Romanian United with Rome, Greek-Catholic Church (BRU) to legality in 1990, the United Church with Rome re-established its role of promoting Christian-National values in all parts of Romania, urged on by those believers who desired the establishment of new parishes. The same thing happened in Râmnicu Vâlcea, where there was a compact group of Greek-Catholics: over 450 people who, overcoming major obstacles due to an immature democracy, managed to sign

of the Parish of Râmnicu Vâlcea on the afternoon of 6 July 2001. Since then, we have been engaged in hard and radical work aimed not so much at the construction of a parish church, as at strengthening the faith of the few Christians present. Step by step, on 15 August 2001, the Feast of the Assumption of the Virgin Mary, the first mass of the Greek-Catholic community of Râmnicu Vâlcea was celebrated in the Roman Catholic Church of Sfântul Anton. Then, on 22 May 2005, the foundations were laid of the future parish church dedicated to Saint Rita of Cascia, patroness of the Community together with the Blessed Virgin Mary. Overcoming all obstacles, on 1 October 2006, all of us had the immense joy of participating in the dedication of the church of the Romanian United with Rome, Greek-Catholic Church in Râmnicu Vâlcea to the Saint of Cascia. Over time, we have enjoyed a series of extraordinary events, such as the Peregrinatio (pilgrimage) of the relic of Saint



Rita in 2011 and 2012. Today, Rita is loved and prayed to in a world, the Orthodox world, where she was little known. It was because of this great devotion to Saint Rita that I asked to start the process of the Twinning of Faith and Peace, on the occasion of the Feast of Saint Rita in 2013 (May 20 to 22) and which will see the two communities, the Sanctuary of Cascia and the Parish Church of Saint Rita of Vâlcea, and the two municipal authorities, celebrate an event in honour of the Saint of Cascia, committed to restoring peace in a world torn by strife and discord.






A meeting for the faith

nother great moment of faith and fellowship took place during the meeting of the Primary Pious Union in Cascia on 16 and 17 March 2013. Despite the weather forecasts predicting inclement weather, the sun that accompanied the two days must certainly have been seen as a welcome from the Saint of Cascia. Saturday morning was marked by prayer with the route of penance "The Way of the Thorn". The long penitential procession, which started from the avenue of the sanctuary, reached the church of St. Augustine at the top of the hill of Cascia. During the phases of the itinerary, participants meditated on the Passion of the Lord and the proximity of the Saint in the fifteen years that she bore the thorn on her forehead. At the end of the ceremony, the leaders of the different affiliates met Mother Abbess Sister Natalina Todeschini and the sisters

to rejoice together to take stock of the activities undertaken at the regional level and for new affiliations from Marcellina (Cosenza) and Abbiategrasso (Milan). A moving moment was the greeting of the Saint's urn, held in the afternoon with meditation, followed by the scholarly catechesis given by Mons. Leonardo Bonanno, Archbishop of San Marco Argentano, on the annual theme of the meeting; "That I know myself, to know Thee". At the end of the long day, after vespers with the Augustinian community, an intense and silent prayer vigil united hearts in the joy of seeing the even more extended family of Augustine and Rita, with its new affiliates. In the emotion of the eyes of





those who have been part of the family for years, one could almost see a moment of renewal of their adherence to Christ the Lord under the guidance of Saint Rita. Sunday opened with the Augustinian voice of Father Remo Piccolomini, ready as always to lead the entire PPU in the footsteps of St. Augustine and make all one heart and one soul, in the neighbourhood, in charity, in fraternal knowledge and in full adherence to the will of God. The prayerful procession with the statue

of Saint Rita (this year from Marcellina) then left a trail across the town of Cascia. which almost seemed to come to a standstill during the short itinerary at the passing of the insignia and the various communities in prayer. The Holy Mass represented the intense moment in which, taking advantage of the preceding reflections and prayers, like the children of the same Merciful Father, everyone gathered around the table of the Eucharistic banquet. "Going back home," concluded spiritual father Fr. Ludovico Maria Centra, "take with you the testimony of Saint Rita and make sure that it becomes spiritual treasure for others who will meet you; be burning lamps in this year of faith." It is almost tempting to say that the time never seems to be enough: "It is good to be here with Thee Lord, with our patroness Saint Rita", yet the greeting and souvenir photos were only the goodbye to the regional meetings.

n 28 March, the Community lost another of its columns: Mother Margherita Brasili, born in 1920. She had entered the Monastery in 1937 at the very young age of 17, welcomed by Blessed Mother Teresa Fasce. She lived with her for 10 years, and was very close to her in sickness and at death. She was young and strong in the faith and the Christian values she had learned in her



family. Meek and ready to grasp and accept the teachings and examples of holiness of the Blessed Mother, she was captured to the point of wanting only to give herself unreservedly to Jesus for the Community, for the Church, for the salvation of souls and for the entire world.

Alexandra Jianua who, despite the difficulties associated with socio-religious conditions in Romania during the communist regime, managed to maintain principles strongly connected to the faith. In 2001, when the Romanian Greek-Catholic nucleus was reconstituted, Alexandra was at the forefront in supporting and promoting the new church of Râmnicu Vâlcea dedicated to Santa Rita.

Lina Trappetti who, with hard work and sacrifice, has never stopped giving herself to others in silence and with humility in everyday life. Born in Spoleto into a large but simple family, she strives every day for her family and her parish, which she serves with passion and without financial reward.

Sister Elsa Caterina Galfrè, who has dedicated her life to helping the less fortunate with love, becoming a missionary in her town. From the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Cuneo, Sister Elsa began voluntary service in 1989 at the prison of Cuneo, carrying out this commitment with passion and deep love for those most in need.

Zenobia Elmi from Marsciano (Perugia), who has not allowed herself to be overwhelmed by her own physical diversity and, like Saint Rita, has entrusted her own life to Jesus. Often finding herself having to face marginalisation and discrimination, her faith has allowed her to live her life with joy and she has found the inner strength that comes from forgiveness, a

virtue that she herself has always venerated in Saint Rita.

Teresina Natalino who, after losing her husband, let herself be guided by faith, which gave her the strength and the courage to convey a message of forgiveness and love. On 5 December 2010, on highway 18 near the town of Sant'Eufemia di Lamezia Terme (Catanzaro), a 22-year-old youth under the influence of drugs careered into eight cyclists killing them. One of them was the husband of Teresina who, though destroyed by pain, bore no grudge but immediately forgave the young man.
