Take care of me, I take care of you

or this issue's editorial - and thinking of the wonderful New Hospital project that we have managed to realise thanks to the Francesca Rava Foundation-NPH Italia Onlus but also thanks to the many benefactors who have generously helped us, each within their own means - I would like to take a cue from the biblical passage in the "In a Word" series (on page 6) edited by Father Vittorino Grossi. The passage refers to the parable of the Good Samaritan (Gospel of Luke 10, 25-37). It is in situations like this that I think of how much the Bible, regardless of one's belief, is a source of inspiration for understanding the human soul, the relationships between people and the daily dynamics that we find ourselves facing. In this sense, the wisdom of the sacred text proposes welcome - in all its facets - as the way, starting with the story of Cain who we have seen was unable to welcome his brother Abel.

When I welcome a person, I'm taking care of that person. Welcome has to do with hospitality, which often recurs in the Bible as a concept: "I was a stranger and you welcomed me" (Matt. 25, 35). Hospitality calls into question responsibility, taking charge of the other. Limiting my space, to make space for you.

What do I mean?

That in the relationship with the other person, the Lord tells us to behave exactly as when we have guests at home. When I have a guest, I give them my attention, I share my space, I put my food and my drinks at their disposal, I listen to them. All this is welcome. It is giving without asking for anything in return. In the same way, I must desire to be in turn the other person's guest. As a guest, I too show my desire to be welcomed. There is reciprocity.

The Good Samaritan, a foreigner, stops to help a man, a Jew, slumped on the road-side after having been robbed and beaten (bear in mind that there was bad blood between Samaritans and Jews, they were often in conflict). Earlier, a priest and a Levite (therefore two people who believed in God, practised the cult, and should have put the teachings into practice) had passed



along that same road, but neither of them had helped the victim. Perhaps out of fear (fear makes us do horrible things even if we are good people). Perhaps because they believe him dead. Whatever the reason, in fact neither of them made a simple gesture of charity.

The Samaritan did not ask who the wounded man was, he only did what he felt was right. He did not investigate first whether the man on the ground was a Jew, he just helped him. Here is who is the neighbour: it is anyone in need that we come across. And welcoming means both accommodating them within ourselves and asking them to be accommodated. Only in this way is love disinterested. Full love.

THE NEW HOSPITAL OF CASCIA IS A REALITY

With work on the "A Hospital for the Valnerina" project of the Monastery of Saint Rita completed, the structure is now ready to welcome those in need

Two specialist centres: Healthcare Residence and Rehabilitation

he fruit of charity, solidarity and faith, and less than a year from the beginning of alteration works, the now former House of Spiritual Exercises of the Monastery of Saint Rita is ready to open its doors to bring the Intensive Rehabilitation Centre of the Hospital - closed for two years due to the earthquake - back to life. This is the outcome of the "A hospital for the Valnerina" project, born from the synergy between the Municipality, the Umbria 2 Health Authority and the Monastery of Saint Rita and made possible thanks to the financial support of the many benefactors of the Monastery and of the Francesca Rava Foundation-NPH Italia Onlus, with the contribution of the Vodafone Italia Foundation. A structured commitment, that of the Francesca Rava Foundation in the earthquake zones, which has also made it possible to provide Cascia with 2 schools, among the 7 realised between Marche and Umbria for children affected by the earthquake. The work of converting the structure into a hospital marks a great and historic achievement for the community, local or otherwise, which will be able to benefit once again from services of excellence for health. In fact, healthcare services will be transferred to the New

Hospital of the Valnerina, except for first aid which is in the Leone XIII car park. Funding for the memorable work came on the one hand from the Francesca Rava Foundation-NPH Italia Onlus which, with the contribution of the Vodafone Italia Foundation, supported the restructuring of the rehabilitation unit, and on the other from the many benefactors of the Sanctuary, devotees of Rita who responded generously to the appeals of the nuns with their donations. We talked about the project - which started in December 2017 and is now ended - with the works director, engineer Lanfranco Castellucci.

At what point are you today, July 2018?

The works are completed and restoration of the two specialist centres for the Health-care Residence (RSA) and Rehabilitation is a reality. The structure comprise 3 floors. On the ground floor: occupational therapy room, 3 surgeries, FKT (physio-kinesiotherapy, ed.) gym, radiology, offices, kitchen, conference room with Wi-Fi, chapel and morgue; on the first floor: rehabilitation with 5 doctor's offices, 1 infirmary, 1 nurse's station, 1 refectory, 1 lounge, 20 beds, 14 rooms and 1 gym for physiotherapy; on the second floor: the RSA with 2 medical offices, 1 infirmary, 1 nurse's sta-

tion, 1 refectory, 1 lounge, 20 beds and 13 rooms. Stairs and elevators, with bed-lifts, connect the floors. All ready for the work of 40 health workers, plus linked activities.

What were the most important interventions? Those on finishes were the most significant. Floors, interior and exterior fixtures, with windows and shutters renewed and motorised. And then the various plants, like the electric system which was totally revamped, the heating system which was updated, in addition to the installation of fans for each area. Finally, the exterior restyling with painting of the facades.

INAUGURATION IN SEPTEMBER

The inauguration of the New Hospital of Cascia is scheduled for September. Having closed this issue of the magazine in late July, we have been unable to tell you about this important day of rebirth for the whole community. We will certainly give you all the updates in the next issue.







What are the strong points? The original structure, built in 1954 and expanded in 1965, was found free from the effects of all earth-quakes, including the last one, and therefore has great structural strength, is earthquake-proof and is safe, to the extent that it hosted some of the people who had been displaced. We then looked at issue of fire safety, positioning two external steel stairs, one on the south side and the other on the north side, and we installed a water system. The communal areas, canteen and the lounge for welcoming visitors and family members are very beautiful, and finally the panoramic view which allows you to enjoy the beauty of the territory of Cascia.

A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he fell into the hands of robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead ... A Samaritan, as he travelled ... took care of him. $Luke\ 10,\ 30\text{-}34$

The Samaritan, religiously judged a 'foreigner' (for the Jews), showed solidarity with a dying victim of a robbery, abandoned along the roadside. He immediately gave him his help because he looked at the suffering of a man and not at his nationality or religious background. In the guise of the sympathetic Samaritan, the Christian world has always seen hidden the Redeemer Jesus, who bends down over all human suffering.

The centre of excellence for patients with multiple sclerosis is back

ehabilitation is the medicine of the future, because we are increasingly faced with untreatable diseases, and being able to allow patients to return to the family or social circles with a high quality of life is fundamental. Cascia has proved to be an example in this and, with the reopening of the Rehabilitation Centre in the former House of Spiritual Exercises of the Monastery, it will once again become so. "The Centre was established almost 15 years ago," says Health Director Dr. Gino Capitò, "as a business and management decision to reconvert the hospital into a highly specialised pole. Over the years, it has been given a rehabilitative profile with great interest for



multiple sclerosis, for which we have become an excellence in treatment, including at national level. Being a rheumatologist, with my arrival Cascia has become the second centre in Italy of rheumatological rehabilitation since 2010 and, from 2015, the year in which I be-

It is not only institutions but the patients themselves true witnesses of a real case of good healthcare - that give recognition to the Centre. Of this Annita Rondoni is certain; from Foligno, she is tenacious and energetic, adviser to the Italian Multiple Sclerosis Association and head of the Al-SM Foligno-Spoleto-Valnerina Operational Group, who has been at the Centre in Cascia twice. Her life has been turned upside down by the illness but for her it was a rebirth, even if it was hard to understand it. "My diagnosis dates back to

came director, the Centre has seen an increase in work so much so that in 2016 it became the first hospital in Umbria in terms of number of hospitalisations from out-

side the region. Then the earthquake rendered the structure unusable, but we did not stop. We activated a home rehabilitation protocol and worked on a rapid relocation, which will soon be a reality. We expect to be able to reopen by September, no longer with 20 beds, but 40 between RSA and intensive rehabilitation, new facilities and enhanced staffing, so a greater potential to offer more services to regional and other users".

2005, after a traffic accident," she recounts. "I recall episodes that happened to me like falling or losing things from my hands and for which I did not give the correct name, namely multiple sclerosis. Life changes, it is your body that changes and you realise that if things fall from your hands there is a reason, your legs do not respond to your movements, but it is not over because life is a precious gift. A large part of what keeps me going

comes from faith which for me is a reason for living". Annita then begins her healthcare path in her hospital, but after four years she needs intensive rehabilitation

and arrives in Cascia, for three weeks. "At the centre, I found professionalism, courtesy and humanity in everyone. It is an environment that is truly lacking, because so many people are without an important point of reference. In Umbria alone, there are 1,800 sclerosis patients.

results achieved by the Centre, Annita recalls a story of an Umbrian friend she met during the rehabilitation in Cascia: "He said he went to Milan, but if he was back on his feet it was thanks to the Centre in Cascia. Despite being a hospital environment, there was serenity and sharing like in a large family, thanks to the volunteers of the Angela Paoletti association who assisted in every need, especially human need. Now, finally, there is a new beginning for the Rehabilitation Centre in Cascia and there are many awaiting the reopening with hands clasped".

An intelligent and alert mother


he sudden tumour certainly slowed her down, even with the convinced joy of being truly closer to the sanctity of Rita. But amid the sufferings of Blessed Maria Teresa Fasce (founder of the Beehive project, ed.) we must also register a concern that led her to exhaustion: ten years of real anxiety for the responsibility of building the new temple dedicated to Saint Rita. Few know of this great anxiety that the Mother had to face, just like a true secretary of Saint Rita, for promoting the devotion and the cult of the saint she had fallen in love with.

She soon found herself between

the devil and the deep blue sea, namely between two opposing factions: one was on the side of architect Brasini, who was also Mussolini's architect, and the other formed by the community of nuns of the monastery and the Provincial of the Umbrian Augustinians, who considered the Brasini project exaggerated for a town like Cascia and ex-

cessively expensive. The controversy lasted for ten years and for Mother Teresa it was a nervewracking nightmare. Finally her opinion and that of the nuns prevailed; they had insistently prayed to Saint Rita and obtained comforting support from her. There was also fraternal support from Don Luigi Orione, who, as a pilgrim visiting

THE BEEHIVE TODAY

Founded in 1938 by Blessed Mother Teresa Fasce and an integral part of the Monastery of Saint Rita of Cascia, the Beehive of Saint Rita supports young girls in difficulty from families with socioeconomic problems. Today, the Beehive is a welcoming home that

assures its young guests (the Little Bees and the Wildflowers) all that is necessary to make them grow in serenity, guaranteeing their education, health care and psychological assistance, adequate nourishment and a home full of love.

All that is needed to be in good health

We live in a society where image and physical form are exasperated by a continuous search for perfection. Eating disorders in adolescents, and lately also present in small children, are increasing. Having to do with children, pre-adolescents and adolescents, we decided to field our skills to try to reduce the risks related to the above. Because food is not just nourishment but also a symbol and an object of exchange, communication and relationship.

First of all, we worked on introducing a menu that helps our guests acquire a correct and healthy diet. We did so with the help of a nutritionist and a psychologist, through informative and preventive meetings about food, eating disorders and all that goes with them. We did so trying to give voice to the discomfort that is sometimes expressed through food.

With the same enthusiasm, we are promoting further training based on doing. Because we are sure that only through experimentation does effective learning - aimed at harmonious development of the person as a whole - take place.

This training path, which we have identified in the Cooking Workshop, combines the teaching of proper nutrition, the targeted enhancement of each Little Bee and her need to always learn new things. These needs meet and take shape thanks to volunteers Ivana and Marcella, who devote themselves to cooking and to the Little Bees with much passion and lively enthusiasm.

Saint Rita could finally count on a sanctuary of her own

Saint Rita, obtained the confidence of the Mother and offered her decisive advice.

Mother Teresa confided to him the terrible suffering caused by the uncertainty that had arisen in dealing with the construction of the sanctuary. She was also losing the friendship of Father Marabottini, her loyal collaborator to that point, creator of the bulletin of Saint Rita (From the Bees to the Roses, today a bi-monthly magazine in Italian, English, French, Portuguese, Spanish and German, ed.) and a precious tool for promotion of the Ritian cult. Don Orione advised the Mother to entrust herself directly to Pope Pacelli and to the Vatican Board of Superintendence. It was a fortunate indication that led to the replacement of the regime's architect with pontifical architect Chiapetta who had already shown that he knew about sanctuaries, like that of

Saint Rita, recently built in Turin.

Ten years of continuous suffering show us the courage and great balance shown by the Abbess in having to fight on several fronts at the same time. The Little Bees (the

little girls welcomed in the Beehive project, ed.) could not deprive themselves of the affection and serenity of such an important mother, yet the worries were so overwhelming as to be able to make every smile and trust disappear. This did not happen. The Mother continued to smile and believe in a Providence that would not have neglected any of the various members of the big family. And in the meantime, Saint Rita could finally count on a sanctuary of her own, while the Mother herself would not manage to see it completed. Death was to surprise her first, but this would not be able to take away the joy every evening of embracing that host of girls who

AUGUSTINIAN YOUTH SUMMER CAMP

From July 24 to 30, 2018, almost 300 youngsters aged between 12 and 19 from all over Italy met in Cascia for the special youth summer camp organised by the Augustinians. Senza TE sono solo MPO. II tempo vola, tu sei il pilota (Without vou are the pilot) was the title and crux of the theme faced by young people, with the help of animators led by Father Michele Falcone: "We realised how important the dimension of time is in the life of our children", explained Father Michele. "During this week we also wanted to make it clear that a value, which for us is fundamental, must be conjugated forcefully over time, and this conjugation that sometimes can appear as a simplification, or even a misrepresentation of the value itself, does not mean that it no longer exists. Like a watercourse, where the value is water and the river bed is time: it can be a tortuous, beautiful path, flat or with waterfalls, sometimes it can disappear and then reappear at a great distance. The water continues to flow, even if not as we have imagined it". The Augustinians, who gave their contribution to the catechesis for young people, are different. Among these, the Augustinian Sisters, Servants of



Jesus and Mary, who accompanied a group of more than 40 young people from Malta in the search for an experience in line with the Synod of Bishops on the theme "Young people, faith and vocational discernment", which will be held from October 3 to 28, 2018.

occasion, listening to his testimony, which he told in the parlour before the nuns and all the groups present at the event, I immediately understood that he was a very special person. His story brought to mind the parable of the mustard seed, the smallest of the seeds which, after sowing, nevertheless turns into a robust and strong plant. I interviewed Vito at a time when the media were lingering on the violence of baby gangs who mercilessly perpetrate acts of absurd brutality (an absurdity corroborated by the fact that it has no motivation) against their peers. Vito is only slightly older than them and this made me think a lot and he touched my heart like a positive gust of wind. Vito appeared to me like that mustard seed, a small yet essential seed of hope and good for the future. The Carini group joined the PPU last October and it is also thanks to Vito's commitment that the association now has 20 members. However, devotion to Saint Rita in those parts is much older. Fervour for the Saint of Cascia has always been particularly felt in Sicily

On the first Thursday we handed out honey sweets and Vito knew about the Saint from his grandmother's stories: "I was 8 or 9 years old and I already knew the story of Saint Rita ... Grandma also gave me a book about her life and I was fas-



cinated by the forgiveness that Rita gave to those bad men who killed her husband. but then, even her whole life is special. As a child I carried her statue in church to recite with others the Novena dedicated to her and in 2013 I joined the PPU as an individual," the young head of the group told me. With the arrival in the parish of the new parish priest Giuseppe Billeci and with the great support of Pina Santonocito, Vito wanted to transform his personal experience with the PPU into a moment of community aggregation: "We only became affiliated as a community in October, but I would like to organise something for young people too, to involve them in the group". Among the first activities that the PPU of

Vito knew about the Saint from his grandmother's stories

Carini has organised, there is the recital of the Fifteen Thursdays of Saint Rita, the prayers of preparation for May 22, the day of the feast of the saint. "I thought of adding a symbol that recalls the qualities of Rita to the recital of the Fifteen Thursday prayers. For example, on the first Thursday we handed out honey sweets in memory of Saint Rita's first miracle. For the second, instead, I asked the parish priest to celebrate a Mass with the final blessing of the students to honour the period of Rita's youth". Parish Giuseppe Vallesi immediately showed himself willing to join the project of Vito and the PPU: "I saw in the parish this great desire of the many devotees of the community and I said to myself 'Why not?' It can also be a moment of growth and enrichment for me, to be more in love with this Saint".

Rita miracle worker

e can have no doubt that Saint Rita was extremely sensitive to the condition of the sick; but the lack of a complete biography contemporary to her does not allow us to know how she put her ardent charity into practice: we can only deduce it.

Certainly she assisted her elderly parents with love until their death; she assisted her husband and children in their illnesses. In Roccaporena she helped those in need, especially during her widowhood; tra-

dition has it that she assisted victims of the plague in the leper hospital and epidemics were frequent at that time.

Without a doubt, however, it was in the monastery that her charity was shown in all its magnitude, favoured by the Augustinian rule that makes charity its foundation: "Dearest Sisters, first of all you love God

and then the neighbour, because they are these the precepts that were given to us as fundamental" (Prologue). In this regard, we have a direct coeval (contemporary, ed.) of the saint: a short biography written by a notary from Cascia in 1457 states: "A most honest nun, religious woman, Rita lived as a nun for 40 years in the monastery of St. Mary Magdalene of Cascia living with charity in the service of God". Saint Rita in Palmira

chorus of voices tells me of the devotion to Saint Rita in Venezuela, and in particular in the town of Palmira, to the north-west of the country on the border with Colombia. The voices are those of Father Adelmo Irene, parish priest of the Church of San Agatòn, accompanied by Wilson F. Quintero, founder of the Pious Union of Saint Rita in the federal state of Tachira and of the work of Saint Rita, Teresa Platas Suàrez and Mercedes Chacón, devotees very active in the parish. In this way I learn that the cult of



Wilson and Teresa hold a rose in their hands as they prepare to offer the symbolic flower of Saint Rita to the faithful.

The cult of Saint Rita has been present in Venezuela since Rita was still Blessed

Saint Rita has been present in Venezuela since the mid-1600s, when Rita was still Blessed, even though mostly limited to the Augustinians. It is from 1900, with the canonisation of Rita, that devotion began to spread, until the birth of the first prayer groups named after the Saint in the '90s. Today, on May 22, in many cities and towns of Venezuela, starting with the capital of Cara-

cas, it is almost patronal feast day. In the parish of Palmira, the cult of Saint Rita is linked mostly to the experience of Mercedes and Teresa. It was in 2007, under the guidance of the then parish priest Father José Antonio Griman OAR (Order of Augustinian Recollects, ed.), that Mercedes set up an apostolate group which had Saint Rita as its guiding figure. Teresa, on the other hand, tells a story that has contributed to increasing faith in the saint in the parish: she puts her recovery from cancer down to the work of intercession of Saint Rita, invoked in the most difficult moments of therapy. The entire parish believes in this grace, even if the only official case of a

miracle operated by the intercession of Saint Rita in Venezuela is that of Francisca Dunàn, a woman cured of stomach cancer, residing in the municipality of Francisco Linares Alcantara, whose capital is the town called Santa Rita. After her recovery, Teresa joined the group called Sorellanza Santa Rita [Saint Rita Sisterhood] which, following the steps of the Saint, helps people who are sick or in need, providing medicines, food, basic necessities and, once a month, preparing lunch for the sick of a psychiatric hospital abandoned by the state. Today, unfortunately, all this activity

of a social nature has become impossible due to the economic crisis that is affecting Venezuela. It is the Fathers of the Order of Augustinian Recollects who also meet the material needs of the people, thanks to the international solidarity network called Arcores. Even the feast of Saint Rita in the parish of San Agatón has suffered the effects of the crisis: on the occasion of the celebration of the feast of May 22, roses used to be distributed along with honey, figs, grapes and holy picture prayer cards, but with the drop in donations and strong inflation the cost of these products has become too high to continue. However, the difficulties have brought people closer to the saint of the impossible: in places where she was not celebrated, says Father Adelmo, she is now celebrated and social networks and the radio have become spreaders of the message of Saint Rita.

process, the urgency is increasingly being seen of someone moving with young people, accompanying them in becoming adults in age

Not just good advice, but a structured "pastoral care"

and in faith. This is the pastoral choice of the Catholic universe and its commitment in the coming years, not only of good advice but of 'pastoral care' structured around indication of the points of reference and the adequate means to such a noble end, substantiated by joy in proclamation of the Gospel.

In this regard, the introduction of the preparatory document specifies: "These things I have spoken to you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be full (Jn 15:11)". This is God's plan for men and women in every age, including all the young men and women of the Third Millennium, without exception. Proclaiming the joy of the Gospel is the mission entrusted by the Lord has to his Church.

Therefore, attention to young people will involve all believers in the near future, even if this seems excessive to someone. In reality, from the beginning of Christian generations, attention to the young has been considered not so much a sensitivity of some bishop as one of the

commands left to us by the Apostles. On the other hand, young people are the most fragile link in the chain of human generations, and today they seem almost ignored by adults in their profound discomfort. Furthermore, if young people like - rightly - having carefree fun, at the same time they need adults able to help them in their free and responsible growth, also in faith. In our time, being drawn into the vortex of the network (Net), they are exposed to the use of cannabis, to (small or large) gestures of self-harm, from "cutting" to "burning", to much else besides. Under such influence, many young people do not study, do not work, do not seek formation,

and, on the contrary, feel paralysed, deciding to exclude themselves and exile themselves. Accompanying them in these difficulties, as well as being a duty for adult society, for a Christian, means continuing the story of the Good Samaritan, that is, of Jesus himself who hid himself in the parable of the Samaritan. Pope Francis feels this problem greatly and is coordinating it in the pastoral choices of the Catholic Church.
