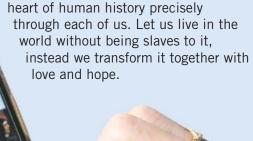
The articles you will read bring us back to a devotion that is in crisis, shoved into the background, which we are

## It is rarely seen today

### The gaze of photographer Giovanni Galardini



n the past, the typical photo of the Feast of Saint Rita was composed of joined hands and raised roses." Giovanni, who has been documenting the Ritian celebrations in Cascia for years, commented on a black and white shot he took in 1993, in which a single lady turns up to the camera, but does not seem to look at it: it is not the lens that cap-

tures what is happening, but his gaze. The eyes and faces of the devotees provided a field of work par excellence for Giovanni, because, as he said, "I saw and perceived the strength of faith there."

The scenario has changed now, and Giovanni struggles to find people's faces because they are hidden by their phones. "The smartphone is becoming a symbol," he reflect-





ed, "because what matters is what it picks up and brings home, so it can be shared with friends and family. I saw many people using their phones to livestream in front of the body of the saint with people on the other side of the screen in a bed, even in hospital." The matter does not depend on the devices, in fact, "The change I noticed," said Giovanni, "is in the approach to faith: whereas before it was the heart of the feast, it's rare to find those who show their devotion today. Those who have joined hands, with tears in their eyes and lips that whisper prayers hide in the corners, when

there are few people left and you can be alone with the saint." And Giovanni is there, to immortalise that special moment, so much so that he closes his eyes as he takes the shot, as if not wanting to violate that intimate and precious instant.

# The Church also speaks digitally

A word with journalist Angelo Scelzo

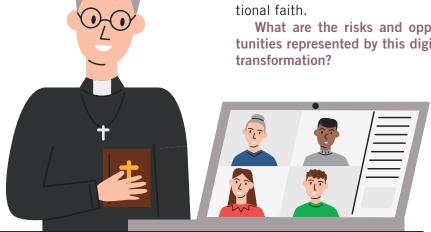


ho is the Church addressing today? In addition to communication of the Gospel and its values to the faithful - which we could assimilate to evangelisation, the primary task of the Church - there is the communication used to speak to institutions, groups, and the public opinion to convey its activities, its architecture, the way in which the Church acts in the world and dialogues with us. This communication is entrusted to professionals and to the tools of the sector, including newspapers, radio, TV and, increasingly, digital means.

Have these latter led to a change in the content and how it is being communicated?

Yes, but it's not just about digital. Because in the meantime not only has the digital revolution taken place but society has also changed, as has the way in which the values of the Church are perceived. Coming into continuous contact with the people puts the Church in the position of having to update itself, not only in a technical sense but in the conception of its values, which, while always remaining the same, are formulated differently according to the era. The defined value of each individual teaching may be affected, but this does not mean that the Church must withdraw from its own teachings; rather, it must communicate them better to a society that is no longer modelled on the values of the traditional faith.

What are the risks and opportunities represented by this digital transformation?



Of course, with digital media we can get to a much larger audience and the message reaches areas impossible to reach before. But it changes the way it reaches them. Speed, rhythm, simultaneity and, in some cases, superficiality represent a risk, because immediacy does not always allow for that reflection inherent in the message mediated by more traditional tools. It is a transition phase in which there are perhaps more risks than benefits because, paradoxically, the Church needs more time today, more opportunities to present and enhance its message. Instead, the tools available tend to break up the message, to make it more superficial. But it is a risk that the Church must take.

Without leaving out those who don't use digital tools...

Of course, it is a question of not turning your back on modernity but also not abandoning your own terrain. The Church must always aim towards the objective of direct encounter, of the possibility of coming into contact. Because hyperconnection does not lead to greater knowledge, but rather to incommunicability. During the pandemic, we witnessed very generous attempts by the parish priests to bring the community together with digital tools, but just as all this was happening, the absence of the community, of the Eucharist, of the encounter, was felt even more. These forms of communication broaden the scope of the Church but we must be able to assess the difference between a communication that repairs an absence from the active kind, aimed at creating community. In this revolution, the Church has understood that this is a changing world precisely because of communication, and it is equipping itself to meet the needs of people who intend to come into contact with it.

Coming into continuous contact with the people puts the Church in the position of having to update itself

Psalm 41: 9: By day the Lord gives me his grace, for Him I raise up my song.

The saying "he who sings well prays twice" is attributed to St. Augustine. For the Bishop of Hippo, in fact, singing is proper to the Christian who, as a pilgrim, expresses the love they carry within in singing. The holy doctor preached: "A song is a fact of love; whoever knows how to love the new life in Christ knows how to sing a new song. God has given us himself as an object to love and the resources to love him. The apostle Paul says, "The charity of God is poured into our hearts. But how? Maybe by our own hand? No. But then how? Through the action of the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Speech 34).

### Return to selfless Love

### The voice of anthropologist Mario Polia

ogether with Professor Mario Polia, anthropologist and university professor, we wanted to explore the intrinsic meaning of "devotion". We asked what it really is and if it has changed over time. Professor Polia explained that there is an innate religious component in human beings. People need to believe in a real, intelligent being, but one that is outside the real. For monotheistic religions it is a Supreme Being, in polytheism they are Gods. The word "devotion" comes from the Latin "devoveo" and means "to dedicate oneself to someone in the form of an offering". This is done by practicing prayer and spiritual sacrifice: people offer prayers in exchange for protection. But devotion must be nurtured, contextualised and taught, because otherwise the Human-God relationship fails. There is an irreplaceable component underlying everything: Love.

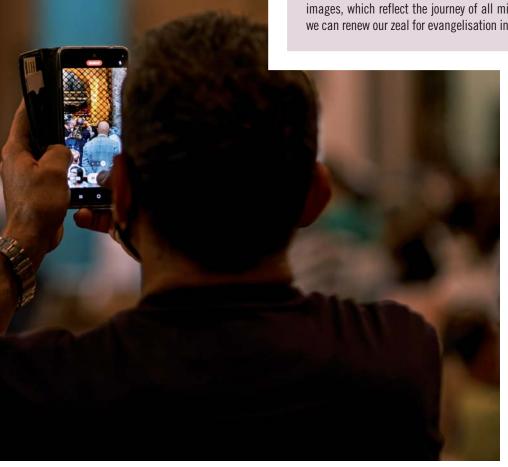
In the current historical context, everything revolves around us. People have unlearned how to love because often it is enough for them to use whoever is useful to them. God created humanity in His image and likeness but humanity creates a God who resembles them. This is not always the case, but if people do not go back to listening to God in the silence of prayer and to learning the culture of Loving, they risk being devoted to themselves only. By nature we



need to transcend but we replace the magical ritual with prayer: who among us has not gone to Church to light a candle before an exam or test? There is nothing wicked about this, but it can become habit and the credo of sects or pseudo-religious groups can be grafted onto it. Devotion still exists but it is based on selfless love that knows well that the saints are only intermediaries. Devotees just believe and that's it. They ask for nothing more in return than the love of those to whom they are devoted. They are devoted to Love out of love alone!

### MISSIONARY DAY HEARTS ON FIRE, FEET ON THE MOVE

This is the theme of the World Missionary Day on 22 October, for which the Pope took his cue from the account of the disciples of Emmaus in the Gospel of Luke. "They were confused and dismayed," wrote the Pontiff, "but their encounter with Christ in the word and in the breaking of the bread sparked in them the enthusiastic desire to set out again towards Jerusalem and proclaim that the Lord had truly risen. In the Gospel account, we perceive this change in the disciples through a few revealing images: their hearts burned within them as they heard the Scriptures explained by Jesus, their eyes were opened as they recognised him and, ultimately, their feet set out on the way. By meditating on these three images, which reflect the journey of all missionary disciples, we can renew our zeal for evangelisation in today's world."







# In defence of Nigerian children's health

n Africa, children can still die from measles outbreaks because they are unvaccinated. Jacob fell ill when he was only two months old. He was transported to the hospital in Namu, Nigeria, because he had rashes on his face and body, a cough and fever. During the first visit, his mother stated that the baby had not been vaccinated because he had been delivered at home. Following investigation it was then found that he had measles, so he was given antibiotics, analgesics, anti-diarrhoeals and other drugs. The little boy slowly recovered and was then discharged. The hospital to which Jacob was taken is the temporary clinic that was lifted up by the Congregation of Our Lady of Fatima after the destruction of St. Virgilius Memorial Hospital in August 2019, due to a fire caused by an electrical failure. Since the beginning of

2023, with your valuable contribution, our Foundation has decided to support the reconstruction works, to support the children and their loved ones in particular. The temporary facility continues to offer essential services, such as vaccinating new-borns against the main deadly diseases, but it lacks the necessary spaces and equipment to be able to respond to all the requests that come from the 35 villages that make up the community of Namu, home to over 35 thousand inhabitants.

### THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN ADMITTED

In 2022, with the limited means at its disposal, the temporary clinic guaranteed health care to 1988 children out of a total of over 12,000 people taken into care: 850 children were treated: 835 were vac-



cinated against six deadly diseases; 303 were born, of which 83 by caesarean section. Children especially suffer from malaria, anaemia, diarrhoea, malnutrition and measles, and efforts are also made to prevent mother-to-child transmission of HIV. What we want to rebuild is a much larger and more modern hospital, which can provide more specialist care and assistance to over 20,000 people every year.

#### THE TESTIMONY

"Before the fire broke out," said Sister Mercy, one of the nuns who serves as a nurse at the clinic, "the hospital was able to take care of the children's health needs. After the fire, we had to start again from scratch and we can't manage the way we did before. Ours is a very important medical facility in the area, as it is considered a point of reference. We do our best to hire the most qualified staff, who can provide the best medical services every single day," she continued. "We mostly deal with

diseases that have become chronic or are at a serious stage, situations that need special attention, and we also provide prevention and health education services. In addition, we had a very active "expert" disease information management centre. Since the fire hit the hospital, we cannot continue with the same standards as we have little space and the structures have been damaged."

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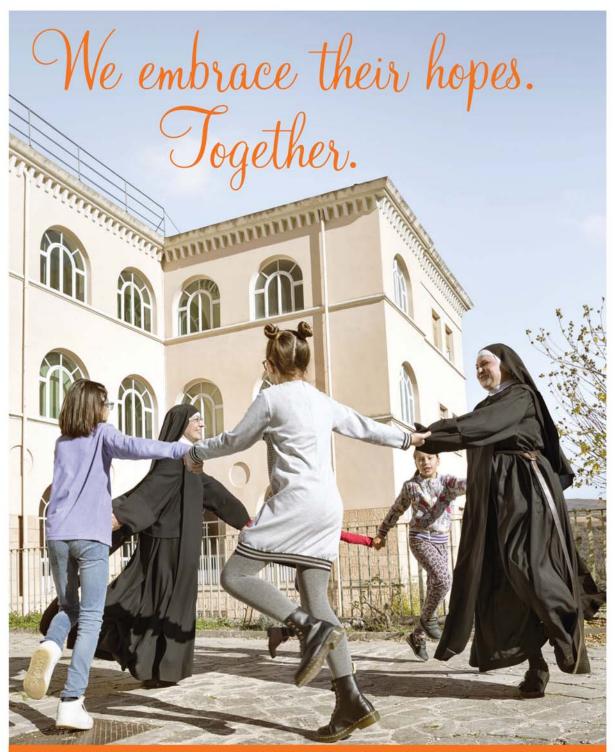

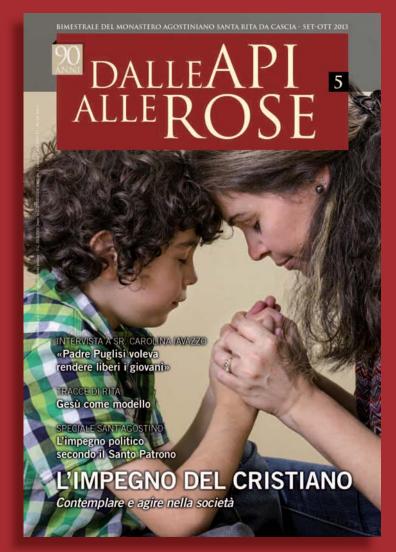
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## A century-long history

# A new style to unite every reader

ather Vittorino Grossi, former editor of the magazine and university professor, is continuing the journey to discover our roots and, in particular, the changes that took place in the magazine as it turned 90. We asked him why the need was felt to renew the communication style and graphic identity. His answer contains the very mandate of the magazine!

Father Vittorino reminded us that the magazine arose from Blessed Maria Teresa Fasce's intuition and her devotion to promoting the news and the needs of Cascia and the Cascians for worshipping Saint Rita. In addition, there were two premises that led to the changes in 2013. The first was that the magazine was entering homes and this was

its mission of solidarity: to bring families closer to Saint Rita and each individual member to the other family members. Family has always been at the heart of Saint Rita and Blessed Mother Fasce: both wanted to bring people closer to the heart of God. The second started from the Second Vatican Council, when many things changed in the Church: there was a turning point in the consideration of the saint, who was included in the Liturgy and so also the 15 Thursdays of Saint Rita. This was decisive for the growth of knowledge and devotion to Rita, and the magazine became the ambassador for this. This, then, is how the style of the newspaper united Catholic readers, sceptics and the curious, becoming a stimulus to consciences.





The images have a clear impact and the texts talk in the manner of the new millennium: clear terms, precise concepts free from false modesty, faithful bearers of that experiential catechesis that every person and family experiences in everyday life. The magazine therefore became more relevant than ever in a historical and social moment in which individualism exacerbated the passing of time. It continued its mission of solidarity, gently bringing readers closer together and uniting them through Saint Rita's courageous message of forgiveness and peace. Many families who were scared by illness, disappointed by a failure or marginalised by their social conditions have found among the pages of the magazine the right word for their situation: not magic formulas but the courage of the truth! It is a truth that makes no concessions, because no one is exempt from fatigue and pain, but precisely for this reason they can feel part of a community that walks the paths of Life, starting from Rita's experience. Not a sigh nor a tear are unknown to Providence: the magazine speaks to the heart and becomes a mirror of everyone's experience!

We asked Father Vittorino if he has particular memories regarding the topics covered. He replied that the magazine is the reflection of a collective work in which everyone makes suggestions, and this allows it to be varied and socially adjustable. Father Vittorino sent his greetings and hoped to be able to spend a day studying the topics addressed by the magazine, in order to highlight the great contribution it has made to society: demonstrating that all there is between saying and doing is Love!

# The Beehive of Saint Rita: always listening to children's needs

On 24 September 1938, 7-year-old Edda Petrucci arrived at the monastery of Cascia, the first of Saint Rita's "little bees", as Mother Fasce called the orphan girls who formed the Beehive. The Blessed Mother hosted several orphans in those years, relying totally on the Providence of God in very difficult times: the work on the construction of the new Basilica and the war that broke out shortly after. Mother Fasce oversaw the education of these girls with great care and played with

them whenever possible. Today the Beehive has grown and is still growing: it welcomes girls who are no longer orphans but who come from difficult contexts, from broken families or uncomfortable living conditions. In the Beehive they not only find a safe roof and daily bread, but following the example of Mother Fasce, they receive affection and love from the religious and lay people tending to them, who carry out their work with competence, but above all with charity.

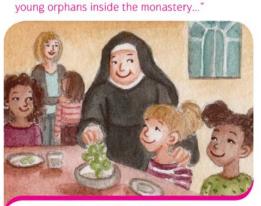

### The fruits of devotion

he dictionary definition of the word devotion is: adherence to the spiritual aspects of worship and religious practices in general. But there is also a second, "trusting abandonment in God", which satisfies me more.

The mystery of Jesus Christ -

Son of God, who became human to the point of dying on the cross for love, to lead humanity, who had grown distant from Him and lost their way because of original sin, back to God the Father - is vast! It is an inexhaustible Source, a gold mine where new rich veins can always be found. Devotion helps us probe the mystery to love it more. It is an affective bond of friendship. trust and confidence. And this is real devotion. It is the same devotion that so many people feel for the saints and which must lead to this. "The servant is not greater than the Master." The saints show us the way to reach Jesus, so that faith, hope and charity in Him may be revived in us. It is a gift of the Spirit both for the person who receives it, for their spirituality, and for the good of the Church. Let's think about how many devotions are addressed to the Son of God. There is that of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which began in France with Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque in 1673 and which Blessed Pius IX extended to the whole Church, call-



ing Christianity back to that human-divine Heart that loves us immensely. Or there is the more recent example of Divine Mercy: Jesus appeared to Saint Faustina Kowalska to help humanity get out of the darkness caused by totalitarian regimes, which blinded the hearts of so many people, inspiring her with the Chaplet of the Divine Mercy. Then, St. John Paul II instituted the Feast of Divine Mercy on the second Sunday after Easter. His limitless mercy is aimed at the salvation of sinners. He died for them. Thus devotion to the Holy Rosary, beloved to the Christian people, is a compendium of the Gospel, "contemplated with the eyes of Mary".

If we have devotion, let us follow it and let us be amazed at what the Lord reveals to his chosen ones.

### Friend to Christ and everyone

Her heart expands to accommodate those who turn to her

et us begin with a question: why do we turn to the saints? What are we looking for, what do we hope for from them? For the them to obtain what we ask for; for them to intercede for our needs; for them to resolve the painful situations we are going through, with their burden of anguish. That's all true, all legitimate. But, we should ask ourselves: is that all?

Let's try to dig deeper: we look for company in the saints. In them, we recognise friends who are able to understand us, to join us by making our requests their own. The saints are our friends, because they have gone through the same troubles in life in which we find ourselves. How did they do it? How did they manage not to succumb, not to let themselves be robbed of their trust? They drew their strength from the friendship of God: this is their secret. It is a friendship that is welcomed first and foremost, guarded as a precious and priceless treasure, reciprocated in the concrete and sprinkled with prayer.

We can also say of Rita that her strength lay in her friendship with humble Jesus. Their spousal covenant started from afar, from the heart of God, who gently repeated to her what he does to each of us: "I have loved you with



eternal love!" (Jeremiah 31: 3).

Rita, like the widow of the Gospel (Mark 12:42), threw her whole life into the "treasure chest" of Christ, without holding back. She could have stopped at the request for consolation for herself, but instead Rita went further, pushing for a reciprocity that involved her entirely: she wanted to become an instrument of consolation and intercession for all.

We can imagine Rita's long vigils, in contact with the heart of Jesus: an inner "bath" in his feelings. To cherish what was dear to Him, to participate in His Passion, offering salvation for all. And Rita's heart expanded, widening immeasurably, to accommodate those who turn to her. This gave rise to the saint that we feel close to us, next to us. Indeed, she is a true friend.

Devotion is friendship. Let us turn to Saint Rita, entrusting our sorrows to her magnanimous heart, but also in the confidence of having in her a trusted friend who accompanies us along the path of Christ's friendship.

### WITH HER, NO ONE IS ALONE

Rita was able to actualise her decision to enter the monastery thanks to the special help of the saints she

prayed to in particular: Saint John the Baptist, Saint Augustine and Saint Nicholas of Tolentino. This is the importance of communion with the saints: they are here, next to us, to pray to the Lord for us, to obtain for us from the Lord that which is good for us. Having experienced the strength and grace of intercession, Rita in turn became a saint who is friend to many, who is sought out to help with the needs of many people who turn to her,

Dear readers, often, before relying on our thoughts alone, we should tune into the frequencies of



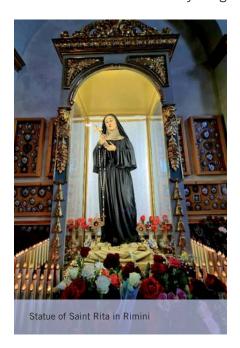

#### DIALOGUE WITH THE MONASTERY



oung people and the Church... what do young people look for and what answers do they find in the Church? And how does the Church present itself to young people?

In answer to the second question, we gratefully recall a Synod held for young people in 2018. Something a Bishop said then seems important to us: "This is the turning point: the humanity of the Church as a way to get through to

the humanity of young people, and then re-propose the truth of Christ as the bearer of a significant fullness that applies not only to today's young people, but to those of yesterday and forever. In this way, the dialogue between the Church and young people is mutually educational, because it leads young people to come out and adults to be freer. Mobility – understood as something that has the flavour of research, of young people's desire

to commit to finding meaning in their own existence – and listening are the two paths to follow to create a new encounter between the Church and young people."

Some interesting aspects emerge from listening to young people. Young people are not closed off. On the contrary, they manifest the desire to be reached in the "virtual" and "real" places they frequent every day and the "outgoing" Church can do it. The Church is facing young people who are willing to be protagonists of their time, to get to work, who have the desire to make their own contribution starting from what they know how to do, and this resource must be cultivated.

When we meet the groups,

there are young people who are not afraid to look you straight in the eye, to scrutinise the hearts and souls of us nuns. God is felt close by, individually and emotionally, in inner silence, in strong moments of joy or pain. We try to offer ourselves as travel companions and seek them out as our travel companions, as Jesus did, to enter into a dialogue with their dreams. It is in everyday life that young people ask for a testimony of authenticity, which shows that being Christian leads to happiness, to a full life, despite the difficulties and suffering.

They seek a present Church, one made up of "flesh and blood" people who are humble, who come at no expense, who spend them-

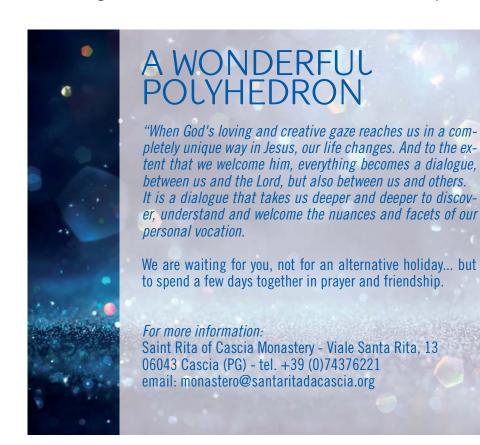
selves and commit, people who listen, dialogue, welcome, accompany and support their choices. In our testimony, they seek reference to Jesus, to the Gospel. It is certainly not the Gospel that has become antiquated – Jesus is such an ancient beauty but one that is also always new – it is us who are not always able to dialogue with the new generations, to transmit the joy of faith, of the encounter with Christ.

And here Holy Father Augustine comes to our aid: "You made us for you, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (Confessions.1, 1, 1). It is so... the tranquillity of our hearts is found in the meek and humble Heart of Jesus. And again: "Let us love the

Lord, our God; let us love his Church! Let us love him as a father, the Church as a mother. Let us love him as lord, the Church as his handmaiden. Indeed, we are the children of the maid... Well then, brothers, keep close to God as a father, and to the Church as mother" (Exposition on Psalm 88, Ila, 14).

For us Augustinians, it is vital to breathe in unison with the Church, with love for the Church, to be Church, to feel the Church, have the soul of the Church, serve the Church, to live on what the Church lives on. And we try to pass it on, to young and old alike, with hope and courage, being in love with Christ and acting as credible witnesses of his Gospel.
